# PACE OF PLAY POLICY PER R&A

'We encourage and promote ready golf'

Ready golf is a commonly used term which indicates that players should play when they are ready to do so, rather than adhering strictly to the

- "farthest from the hole plays first" stipulation in the Rules of Golf.

  Hitting a shot when safe to do so if a player farther away faces a challenging shot and is taking time to assess the options or is delayed.
- Shorter hitters playing first from the tee or fairway if longer hitters have to wait.
- · Hitting a tee shot if the player with the honor is delayed
- Hitting a shot before helping to look for another players lost ball
- Putting out even if it means standing close to another's line
- Hitting a shot if a player who has just played from a bunker is still
- farthest from the hole but is delayed in taking their next shot
- Chipping onto the green even if you are closer than other players
   Don't delay the game by making cards, replacing gloves, measuring

If a group fails to keep their place on the course and loses more than one hole on the players in front, they shall call the following group playing behind to play through.

# CONDITION OF COURSE

Before leaving a bunker, a player is responsible to ensure the sand is smooth and free of all depressions.

CARRY and USE a bag or bottle of sand. Repair all your divots on fairways and pitch marks on greens

# LOCAL RULES

## Course Markings

- Out of Bounds White Stakes
- · Penalty Areas Yellow Stakes
- · Lateral Penalty Areas Red Stakes
- Ground Under Repair White Lines and/or Blue Stakes

#### Integral Part Of The Course

- · Rocks, Rain Shelters and bridges are integral parts of the course
- The ball must be played as it lies or declared unplayable

## Moveable Obstructions

· Penalty Area & Lateral Penalty Area Stakes

#### Immoveable Obstructions

- · Distance & GUR markers
- · Buggy Tracks & Service Roads
- Drainage sumps, sprinkler heads, valve heads and rubbish bins

NOTE: Relief without penalty under Rule 16.1b

### Edging

The edging grooves around the aprons or fringes of putting greens are ground under repair. If a player's ball lies in or touches a groove or a groove interferes with the area of intended swing, the player may place the ball at nearest point of relief not nearer the hole without penalty under Rule 16.1d

#### Aeration Holes

On the putting green, a ball that comes to rest in or on an aeration hole may be placed at the nearest spot not nearer the hole that avoids the situation under Rule 16.1d

# Alternative to Stroke & Distance for Lost Ball or Out of Bounds

When a player's ball has not been found or is known or virtually certain to be out of bounds, the player may proceed as provided in Section 8E-5 with a penalty of two strokes.
